Chilly Weather Fails To Spoil Kumquat Festival



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Can You Hear Me Now? City Commissioners Get Earful About New Phone System

There's definitely one call City Commissioners are responding to and it's the complaints regarding the new phone system at City Hall.

"We're all frustrated. I think that there's got to be some solution. We're paying a lot of money for a new phone," Mayor Camille Hernandez said during the Jan. 24 commission meeting. "I can't believe that this is happening."

The telephone system was installed when the new municipal complex opened last year, but there have been complaints that citizens are having trouble reaching departments and that calls are not being returned when messages are left.

Bermice Mathis informed Hernandez and commissioners in a Jan. 15 letter that she had spoken with City Manager Billy Poe about the city's automated telephone system. Mathis said she told Poe she didn't like the system and she didn't feel it was fair to her as a taxpaying citizen to have to wait for a return call from the city.

Tens of thousands of people made a huge fuss over a tiny fruit on a chilly Saturday during the 20th Kumquat Festival.

"I think it's getting bigger every year. I like the different vendors," said James Lackey of Brooksville.

The festival celebrates the kumquat, an orange-like fruit related to the citruses, with an edible sweet rind and acid pulp, which can be eaten raw or used in preserves.

About 400 vendors set up shop at this year's festival, and more wanted to participate but couldn't because there was no space left in the multiple block area downtown. That popularity allows the

Tours, Hot Air Balloons To Showcase Ranch

Sprawling across 2,050 acres of fields and farmland, Little Everglades Ranch is an oasis of green grass fields and a perfect place for entertaining events.

Iconic for once hosting steeplechase horse races, the ranch is now embarking on a new venture: Ranch Days.

Event organizer Kevin Campbell said he and his wife Andy have wanted to put on a big event like this for years, and on Feb. 11 and 12 their hard work will be realized.

This is the first 'home-grown' production put on by the ranch since the steeplechase was shut down when the recession hit in 2008. Since then, the property has been host to numerous events including high school cross country championships and extreme sport runs, such as the Savage Race.

Dade City Arrests Man Finds That The Camera Never Blinks

Randell Alexander Love, 41, of 3833



Allen Road, Zephyrhills, was arrested by Dade City police on Jan. 16 on charges of burglary of a business and felony theft 2nd/subsequent convictions. Love allegedly entered Walmart, 12650

U.S. 301, at 10:04 p.m. on Dec. 16 through an exit door. The store was closed at the time. Once inside, Love allegedly took a Nextbook 2-in-1 tablet, valued at \$229. Love was arrested at the Pasco County Jail where he was being held for other offenses. A check of Love's criminal history disclosed that he did have prior convictions for theft/ larceny for more than four times from mul-

tiple law enforcement agencies in Florida. Love was positively identified from surveillance video of the crime in progress.

Kalen Fitzpatrick, 25, of Wesley Chapel,



was apprehended by Dade City police on Jan. 11 on a warrant charging him with violation of probation - burglary. He was booked into the Pasco County Jail after the warrant was confirmed.

Tom Chance Green IV, 19, of Trilby, and Limai Tyricke Lopey, 18, of Lakeland, and Joseph Edward Nall, 19, of 38253 Hampton Ave., were arrested by Dade City police on Dec. 30, 2016. Each was charged with possession of marijuana – less than 20 grams. Police stopped the men due to their being at a closed park on Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard after hours. An odor of marijuana could be detected as an officer approached the vehicle in which they were seated. The three men reportedly admitted to having marijuana in their possession. A blunt - containing a trace amount of marijuana - was found in Green's backpack. A blunt was located in Lopey's lap, under his cell phone, where he had attempted to conceal it. Also, a baggie of marijuana who located in the passenger door handle where Lopey had been sitting. Nall admitted to being in possession of marijuana. He was also charged with driving while his license was

suspended or revoked. All three men were given notices to appear in court.

James Monroe Sheets II, 40, of Wesley



Chapel, was apprehended by Dade City police on Jan. 19 on a Hillsborough County warrant charging him with violation of probation – grand theft auto. Sheets was booked into the Pasco County Jail

upon confirmation of the warrant.

The information provided in the Dade City Police report is taken from public record. All parties are considered innocent until proven guilty.

compete in brute strength with two classes; light (under 3,400 pounds combined horse weight) and heavy (over 3,400 pounds), these elite horses train in the off season like any athlete, pulling weights several times a day to build muscle and stamina. Like the old farming days, bragging rights are the main prize for the strongest teams of these gentle giants. Even thought their work no longer involves pulling a plow or hauling logs, these champions remind us of the horsepower needed for a farm's daily chores.

The Hoffman Challenge Traveling Quilt Collection of quilts and clothes will be on display during the fest. The Hoffman Challenge, started in 1988, has grown to be a premiere traveling exhibit of fiber artists.

On Saturday and Sunday afternoons there will be a trunk show and quilt appraisals presented by Brenda Grampsas, noted quilt historian. been disconnected at her home although she had prepaid her bill. She added she had to wait for two hours for someone from City Hall to return a message she had left regarding the issue. By then her water service had been turned back on.

"I told Mr. Poe there is no reason for any citizen to wait from one to two hours to get a return call from the city," Mathis' letter said.

"I am in total agreement that our phone service as currently set up is not effective or responsive to our city residents who are footing the bill," Commissioner Jimmy Shive said in an email that was read at the meeting. "Customer service over everything should be our number one priority." Shive was unable to attend the meeting.

"It would be my suggestion that the phone rings to four other mail stations and "I don't believe all calls should be placed to only one reoccurring mailbox." (He was referring to the City Clerk's office.)

"Not making adequate changes now would be a bad public perception and fly in the face of taxpayers," Shive's email said.

"I think there ought to be an option where you can talk to a live person if you want to," Commissioner Scott Black said.

Poe explained that callers are given various options when they dial the main number of (352) 523-5050. They can dial a specific extension if they know that person's extension; they can use the 1 key to search for a person's name; or they can press 0. If they press 0, their call is directed to the general mailbox where they can leave a message for their call to be returned.

Commissioner Nicole Deese Newlon then go to voice mail," Shive's email said. asked if there was a way to go to voice

mail and to then to say "You know what, I want to hit 0 again instead and see if someone is back at their desk by then.' If there's a way to do that, then I would like to do that."

"The change to 0 has not been done yet because we are waiting for the vendor to come in and he and I will change that ourselves," Poe said.

Problems with some of the mailboxes where people left messages were one of the reasons people's calls weren't being returned, Poe said. He added that those concerns have been addressed.

The (352) 523-5050 is not the only number that goes into City Hall. People calling (352) 523-5053 will be connected to members of the water utility billing department.

"I will say that with Dr. Mathis' issue the number that would have been easier for her to call would have been (352)

523-5053, because it was a water-related issue," Poe said.

He added that the direct number for employees at the front desk is (352) 523-5052.

"I still can't guarantee that someone is going to answer because if someone is in front of that person they're not going to answer that phone," Poe said.

"That's what I don't get," Hernandez said. "Somebody in a town this size with the number of employees should be able to answer the phone. "What we all want is that personal touch - someone to tell us the person we want to talk to isn't available."

Happy to hear that she got the attention of the commission, Mathis will need a bit more convincing that things will change.

"I hope that you get this worked out eventually. I'm willing to try anything but I want this to be successful," she said. "And I want this it be comfortable for me."


Greater Dade City Chamber of Commerce to be more selective when choosing vendors for the increasingly popular festival.

Vendors sold wares ranging from knitting supplies and health products to gourds, kumquat pies, beer and marmalade.

"Oh, it's lovely," Mary Booth of Lakeland, said of the festival. "It's very nice. There are a good variety of vendors for everybody."

Her husband, Charles, offered a different opinion. "There's not enough for the guys to look at," he said. He added that he would like to see more vendors who offered items for woodworking and similar hobbies.

"We love it. It's huge," said Jeanette Nagel. This was the first Kumquat Festival she and her husband, Dennis, had attended. The couple from Buffalo, N.Y. that spends

the winter months in St. Petersburg said they would definitely come to the festival again.

The Gude family of St. Joseph was on hand with their Kumquat Growers tent set up in the parking lot of the Wells Fargo Bank. A steady crowd of people streamed in and out of the tent to purchase a variety of kumquat products.

Food vendors at numerous locations offered elephant ears, hot dogs, hamburgers, coffee, soft drinks and other items. Then there was the Redneck Steak Beef Jerky stand that was in a league all its own.

Area restaurants also reported bustling sales during the festival.

There was plenty of diversions for children, including a rock-climbing wall, pony rides, bounce houses and other activities.

A variety of entertainment included musical groups performing on the west steps of the Historic Pasco County

Courthouse, and Johnny Shelton, of America's Got Talent fame, strumming his guitar in the parking lot of Kafé Kokopelli.

Hundreds of classic and collectible cars and trucks filled the parking lot of the Robert D. Sumner Judicial Center.

A hearse built on a VW chassis with a costumed skeleton figure standing outside competed for attention with a 1966 Corvette Stingray with a 427 cubic inch Turbo-Jet V-8 engine and four-speed transmission.

City workers and volunteers quickly cleared the downtown area of any evidence of the festival within hours after it closed and the planning for the 21st Kumquat Festival almost immediately began.



Live Butterfly Exhibit At Pasco County Fair

The UF/IFAS Pasco County Cooperative Extension Service Master Gardeners will be hosting a live, daily butterfly exhibit at the Pasco County Fair from Feb. 20-26.

"Interactive butterfly exhibits, like the one Pasco Master Gardeners produce for the Pasco County Fair, enable children and adults to get an up-close look at the lives of these important pollinators," said County Extension Director Dr. Whitney Elmore. "Attracting wildlife to your lawn and garden can be as simple as the addition of a few plants that attract butterflies. Butterflies are not only important ecologically; they are fun to watch and easy to attract."

Come interact with dozens of butterflies as they flutter around pollinator and host plants. This unique Master Gardeners 'Butterflies and Blooms' exhibit will be at the top of the hill behind Higgins Hall on the Pasco County Fairgrounds.

new to the plate.

Even though the ranch comprises thousands of acres, most events use less than a quarter of that. Because of that, Campbell has organized five different ways for visitors to explore the property and it's mysterious appeal.

"People have always asked us when they come out ... if we give tours," Campbell said. "So part of this event, of why we're doing this event, is to give people a chance to see the ranch."

With that in mind, a Zephyrhills Boy Scout troop will be leading hiking tours across the property, a tram will scoot across the multiple fields, and a 12-seat swamp buggy will delve into the wetlands to go even deeper into the ranch.

Campbell said one of the more exciting tour vehicles will be provided by a larc, a Vietnam era boat and land cruiser, which was originally used to transport equipment off of ships that couldn't dock in Vietnam. It's duck-tour like presence will provide an exciting adventure for participants on the ground and in a lake across the property. The last, and most uplifting, tour vehicle will be two hot air balloons which, weather permitting, will offer tethered rides so visitors can get an aerial view of the ranch.

On the night of Feb. 11, Campbell hopes to welcome an additional three hot air balloons to participate in a 'hot air balloon glow.'

"They're going to fire up their balloons which makes the balloon illuminate, it's like a light bulb up inside of there. And it will just be real pretty up in the evening sky," Campbell said.

All of the tours will be offered for a fee and the two-day event will also feature a slew of free musical entertainment and live shows. Where the finish line used to be for the steeplechase on the 1.25-mile long grass track, "exciting exhibitions" will be performing both days.

Tino Wallenda will perform highwire walking, Lady Kitty will bring some feathered friends for a birds of prey presentation, and Jim Mendenhall, famous for his involvement with the San

"It will always remain a working ranch and a nature preserve and an events facility," Campbell said. "The ranch is also such a beautiful place to do this at, I'm really hoping people take advantage of that."

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Dade City Boasts Nation's Cheapest Rent

National Survey: **Apartments** Are Least Expensive Here

The average cost to rent an apartment in Dade City garnered some national attention recently when it was declared that the county seat is the least expensive place to rent in America.

granted The title was via apartmentguide.com's blog in a brief article, which listed the top 50 cheapest places to rent. A feature article on Dade City followed the list, explaining why it is a desirable place to live in addition to the low cost.

The website aimed to find cities where

people can rent an apartment for less than the national average, which is around \$1,100 for a 1-bedroom, and \$1,250 for a 2-bedroom, according to an apartmentlist. com rent report.

Dade City's average rent according to Apartment Guide registered a mere \$272 per month.

Apartment Guide editor Kari Lloyd said the title is overall a good thing for the city to have attached to its name.

"To be honest, I think people are really looking for affordable housing these days. It shows it's a great place to consider if you're looking to spend less on your rent," Lloyd said.

The average price was determined by Lloyd's website using a specific methodology:

"The following data has been gathered from Apartmentguide.com and Rent.com 2016. The average entry price for each city has been taken from 1-bedroom units. Units that had prices lower than 200 were excluded."

Another positive aspect of Dade City's apartment accommodations is its proximity to the city of Tampa. Being close to a metropolitan area without paying city rent is always a positive, the site stated.

Dade City Mayor Camille Hernandez agreed with Lloyd in that having affordable housing is a bonus for the city's growth.

"This speaks to an undiscovered value in Dade City. Individuals should take advantage of these [affordable rents] while they are still available as east Pasco, and more specifically Dade City, emerges as the new trendy place to be seen, work and play," Hernandez said via email.

active listings in the month of November at the Greater Dade City Chamber of Commerce said aside from affordable rental rates he would like to see housing opportunities expanded into central Dade City.

"I would love to see more downtown residential, including apartments, to help our business community become a 16hour city," he said. "Our community has great shops and restaurants and has a super 'walkability' factor, very conducive to downtown apartment living."

The only other city on Florida mentioned on the list was Pace in Santa Rosa County, coming in at number two with an average rent of \$309. The remaining top five cities were located in Oklahoma, Kansas and Utah.
