Marines To Strike Up The Band

Free Performance Will Fill Downtown With Patriotic Sound

Dade City is in for a patriotic treat at the end of the month when a musical guest will make a special appearance downtown.

The Parris Island Marine Band will entertain at the historic courthouse square on March 26 for a rather unique performance.

Organizer Bobby van Allen said he was beside himself when he learned of the possibility of bringing the band to Dade City for locals to enjoy.

The event, which involved personally filing paperwork in Washington D.C., was scheduled and confirmed in a speedy 45 days.

"We're doing this for the community ... Enjoy a family day of music," van Allen said. "We're blessed every day we wake up here in America. It's a highlight and an honor the United States Marine Corps Band is coming to Dade City to play."

Cox Elementary Party Caps Year-Long Celebration

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Dade City Arrests Suspicious Activity Invites Police Crackdown

Sharmane La Vetta Ross, 36, of 38412 Lake Ave., was




arrested by Dade City police on Feb. 17 on charges of possession of cocaine and possession or use of paraphernalia. She was stopped in the area of Hampton and Railroad avenues at 3:39 p.m. for being in an area where drug activity is known and where drugs are currently found. She was allegedly acting in a suspicious

manner by wearing a thick jacket during warm weather, attempting to put her hands inside her pockets several times and riding back and forth on her bicycle. A pat down was conducted of Ross' person. She reportedly confirmed she had a weapon on her to include scissors and allowed the officer to reach into her pocket to find the scissors. Ross spontaneously admitted to having a small piece of crack cocaine in her wallet, which was later found, as well as two glass pipes in a cigarette packet, in her jacket. The white rock substance and residue in the glass pipe both field-tested positive for cocaine. She was booked into the Pasco County Jail.


Justin Boyd, 20, of Lacoochee, was apprehended by

Sometimes One Way Is The Wrong Way

It's not uncommon to hear stories of someone going the wrong way on one of the many interstate highway systems. Usually the result is catastrophic. When two objects meet head-on with both traveling at a high rate of speed you don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure out what happens.

We have our own set of problems right here in east Pasco County when it comes to one-way streets.

Take Zephyrhills.

I was heading north on Seventh Street, which is one way and has two lanes. I was driving in the left lane when the person driving in the right lane decided to make a left turn and, without looking, made a hard left and cut in front of me and a long line of traffic and about caused a chain reaction.

That's the first time that happened to me but I have heard many stories from others that this is not so uncommon.

I have seen people coming out of one of the many businesses on Seventh Street and turning south, going in the wrong direction. They usually get a clue after they make the turn and are staring at a bunch of red signs indicating they are going the WRONG WAY. Also drivers are quick to let them know they need to change direction

some not as politely as others.

And in Dade City it's not rare to see people making a left turn out of the post office trying to get back to the main highway. For the most part these examples usually happen more often with the influx of visitors and seasonal residents coming into this area that are not familiar with the traffic pattern here. I'm not really complaining but these roadways can be confusing at times.

I think for the most part these roads are marked pretty well but the problem is getting worse and worse. Thank God that the speed limit is pretty slow. These are not super highways but every now and then some treat them like they are. I pretty much know where law enforcement catches a few and sometimes I pray that they will be there when someone in a major hurry flies past everybody.

It is our responsibility to make sure the direction we are going is correct. It may be too late if a wrong turn is made. "I just didn't know" are not the words you want to say or explain to a family member because you caused an accident that causes injury or took a life.

As long as I am talking about traffic when you make a right turn at a red light you must come to a complete stop first. Do not blow your horn at the person that does this. The rule in Florida is to stop first, look and then proceed if the coast is clear. Oh, and lastly at a four way stop. Each vehicle must come to a complete stop. I don't care how big of a hurry you are in. Don't follow the guy in front of you through the four way stop. He stopped and waited his turn. Now it's your turn to wait.

Following some very basic rules and traffic courtesies can make driving in this area bearable. Not following the rules can wind up making your day one that you will probably not want to remember for a very long time.

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of cancer survivors, caregivers and volunteers are going to do whatever they can to raise money for the cause.

The Dade City Relay has traditionally been held in April, however this year's usual date coincided with the Easter holiday causing organizers to move it nearly a month earlier. Gina Granger is returning for her second and final year organizing the event, and said even though teams have had less time to prepare and there are fewer registered teams so far, the overall money raised is higher than it was at this point last year.

Other events such as Zephyrhills' Founders' Day and the Dade City Spring Antique Fair and Market both occur on the same day as the relay, but Granger said Founders' Day will be mostly finished by the start of relay and she hopes the antique fair will only boost fundraising efforts.

"On our survey from last year a lot of folks asked for it to be earlier in the year so we could hopefully get a lot of snowbirds to come to the event and support it," Granger said.

Organizers have set a goal of raising \$55,000 for a second time in a row. Last year's total was just under \$50,000. Granger is hopeful they will meet the goal this time around. Total funds raised won't be determined directly after the relay, as the American Cancer Society does not close out their fundraising year until Aug. 31. According to the Dade City relay website, 16 teams were registered with the event as of Tuesday with about \$30,000 raised.

Granger said that a donation of \$100 provides one night of lodging at a Hope Lodge for a patient and their caregiver. Patients are not always able to travel to treatment centers for their needed appointments, so close lodging is an important service provided through funds raised at events like Relay for Life. This year's survivor brunch will be held Saturday at 10 a.m. at the American Legion Post #15, located at 37745 Church Ave. in Dade City. Survivors who wish to attend are encouraged to call 1 (800) 227-2345 as soon as possible to register and ensure they get seating and a survivor t-shirt.

The 2017 theme will be Passport to a Cure. Each team has chosen a country to represent, and their 'campsite' and individual fundraising efforts will be decorated accordingly. Themed laps and activities will be held throughout the evening, including a "Walk Like An Egyptian" lap, where The Bangles' song will blare through downtown.

"All of our activities committee, they did an excellent job planning the fun games and activities for the day. They tie in to our theme and back to the American Cancer Society services. It's going to be really fun," Granger said. "We've got a couple of new, funny games this year that will probably raise a few eyebrows but be funny at the same time."

The biggest difference for this year's downtown Relay is the route that walkers will take during the 12-hour event. The new path will go down Meridian Avenue from Fifth Street to Seventh Street, then turn down Sixth Street until Pasco Avenue, and then turn back around to meet up with Meridian again.

"We're hoping to improve the event experience with this change and also reduce the footprint a little bit so that will free up a couple streets for parking," Granger said.

After a full day of walking, participants are meant to feel exhausted and be reminded of what a cancer patient experiences through chemotherapy treatments. The luminaria ceremony will be held at 9 p.m. with closing ceremonies at 11:45 p.m.

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Ideas For Better Sleep

Have you ever had trouble sleeping? According to National Sleep Foundation's Inaugural Sleep Health Index, almost half of Americans have experienced poor or inefficient sleep at least once a week. WebMD and the Centers for Disease Control have assembled the most common issues that can affect your sleep and ways to deal with them:

• Blue light from technology can keep your brain stimulated for hours after turning it off. Instead, try reading by a soft yellow light prior to bed.

• Try to go to bed and wake up at same time even on weekends. Use a bright light to begin the day.

- Try to limit naps to 20 minutes.
- Don't look at the clock all night.
- Have the appropriate pillows and

mattress support. Keep the thermostat in the 60s.

• Try airtight dust proof mattress covers to help eliminate allergies.

• Avoid doing work in bed.

• Don't work out hard too closely to bedtime.

• Avoid caffeine after lunch.

• Eat only a light snack 1 hour before bedtime instead of a heavy meal.

• Avoid alcohol – it makes for a restless sleep.

• Don't drink liquids about 2 hours before bed.

• Try white noise to cancel out disruptive sounds.

• Avoid nicotine – it is a stimulant.

• Avoid pets in the bed – this goes for children too.

• Avoid stressful thoughts before bed. Try meditation, prayer, or journaling.

• Be careful with sleeping pills. Use of them should be short term while lifestyle changes are made.

See your physician if sleepiness still occurs longer than 2-4 weeks.

Hopefully, you can use one or more of these ideas to help you get a better night's sleep.

the area that just wanted to come and be able to visit the school," she said.

A total of funds raised from meals sold, silent auction items and donations had not been determined at press time. Whatever the total, Steinacker said the school will start by using the money to purchase 'buddy benches' and picnic tables to place by the playground.

Snowbirds or new residents of the area had heard about the school's legacy and celebration and were interested to see the architecture and original structures on the campus, she said. Close to 300 people stopped by the school throughout the afternoon.

"It was everything we wanted it to be. People just had a great time visiting and smiling; remembering when they worked together, remembering when they went to school together," Steinacker said.

Buddy benches are becoming more popular in schools across the country, according to the principal.

"Children are encouraged to sit there when they need a buddy to be able to hang out with or if they are willing to be a buddy," she said. The benches are

designed to curb bullying or isolation.

A number of guests at the celebration could spot and catch up with former teachers from their elementary school davs

About a dozen poster boards touting facts of important figures in the school's

history were posted up on one of the brick walls around the courtyard, creating a 'memory walk' for interested readers.

Inside the school's newly renovated cafeteria, sit-down and to-go Italian lunches or early dinners were served for a small price. Baked ziti, salad, a dessert

and drinks were catered from Piccola Italia in Zephyrhills.

Tables were decorated with laminated placemats designed by students depicting the façade of the historic school. Miniature trees were decorated with pictures of students and their friends or families. And along another row of tables, a table runner was designed specially for the event, containing old class photos and depictions of the original buildings from back in the day.

"The jazz band did a phenomenal job. I just thought it was the perfect thing to play while people were visiting and reminiscing," Steinacker said of the Pasco High School Jazz Band.

Although it was the last event the school will hold in honor of the 90th anniversary, there will be some meetings at the end of the year regarding a time capsule. School administrators have worked throughout the year to compile historical photos and documents, and they plan to contain those in the capsule, as well as consider input from the students.

A nearly 8-minute video paying homage to Cox Elementary is posted on the Pasco County School's Facebook page.

"It's such a cool setting," he said, referring to the outdoor location in front of the old courthouse on Meridian Avenue.

The band will play a select number of songs, comprised mostly of military marches, sprinkled in with a few recognizable Broadway or concert band

tunes. Gunnery Sgt. Brad S. Rehrig, drum in community events or parades about major, has travelled all over the United States and in many areas of the Pacific Islands, he said. The band participates



once a week, and is always booked for major holidays such as Fourth of July and Memorial or Veterans Day events.

"The most enjoyable thing is to speak to people that have not necessarily talked to a Marine before or seen a Marine band," Rehrig said. "Even just to talk to many different people from all over the country and all over the world, and see what they think of our performances and the Marine Corps in general," is his favorite part of playing at community events.

Attendees are encouraged to bring a blanket or lawn chair to enjoy the 3 p.m. performance in the outdoors on the Sunday afternoon, as seating is not guaranteed. Picture opportunities for children alongside Clydesdale horses and fitness presentations from special forces officers will be set up downtown about an hour before the program starts, van Allen said.

The band has never performed in Dade City, making their visit even more special.

One of the more unique things about the performance is the format, van Allen said.

After the Marine musicians perform a select number of songs, they stick around and mingle with the audience, welcoming questions from anyone who has curious questions about the band or the military service.

"It's supposed to be very interactive. We just thought it'd be a cool opportunity," van Allen said. "Come to enjoy the downtown; come with the family and learn."

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The event is sponsored by Farm Bureau Insurance in conjunction with the Greater Dade City Chamber of Commerce, the City of Dade City and Jimmy's Sanitary Services, Inc.

Originally established in October of 1915, the band's primary objective is to provide musical support for Marine graduations and other military ceremonies, according to the official Marine Corps website.

However, in addition to their regular duties, the band is known for travelling the United States to perform concerts and march in parades.

When the band was first formed, the dozens of musicians in the group doubled as marksmanship instructors, close combat instructors and provided support for various units on the depot, the website says. Today, the Marines of the Parris Island Marine Band make up the concert band, marching/ceremonial band, brass band, brass quintet and a jazz combo.

United Way Boosts Sunrise With \$10,000

Domestic Violence Center Earns Annual Grant

The Sunrise of Pasco County Domestic & Sexual Violence Center has been awarded a \$10,000 Outside Agency grant by the United Way of Pasco.

Vicki Wiggins, director of development for Sunrise, said the money will be used to help pay part of the salary of a recently created shelter advocate position.

The advocate was hired because the size of Sunrise's shelter has nearly doubled in the past four years from 24 beds to 40 beds, Wiggins said.

A shelter advocate works directly with people who

are staying at the shelter and helps them with basic needs, such as childcare, and help navigating through the court system.

Sunrise is the only agency in Pasco County that is certified to help victims of both domestic violence and sexual assault, Wiggins said. The Salvation Army operates a shelter in west Pasco for domestic violence victims.

Sunrise is a nonprofit organization depending solely on grants and contributions to help provide its services.

No fee is ever charged to people who are receiving services from Sunrise.

Wiggins joined Sunrise in October after having worked in fundraising in the athletics department at Saint Leo University.

Sunrise of Pasco County traces its origins all the way back to 1982 when a Dade City violence survivor decided to become an advocate for other victims in the area. Soon, there was an office in City Hall and concerned citizens were offering their own homes as refuge for survivors fleeing their abusers.

Sunrise secured a safe house in 1987 and gradually expanded its services to meet the needs of the community.

Not only does Sunrise offer comprehensive services such as advocacy, counseling and legal resources for survivors but the agency strives to educate the community to prevent domestic and sexual violence from happening in the first place.

Sunrise has a 24-hour crisis hotline - (352) 521-3120 - that victims may call for assistance.

Two juveniles were arrested last week for their alleged role in a Feb. 25 attempted burglary of Tin Can Pam's grocery store.

The grocery store case is one of four that the Dade City Police Department is investigating.

Just a few doors down at 14427 Seventh St., thieves threw a brick through the window of Dade City Jewelry, on Feb. 20. They then smashed a display case and took a gun and approximately \$1,000 in jewelry, Velboom said.

Kiefer's Village Jewels, 37850

Meridian Ave., was burglarized a week later at 3 a.m. Two suspects wearing masks or hoodies threw a brick through the window to gain entry, the chief said. The culprits took some jewelry but dropped it as they fled when police arrived. Velboom said the officers arrived within two minutes of the burglary being reported.

A day later, someone threw the rock at the door of Dollar General, 14645 Seventh St., but failed to gain entry.

It is unusual for so many burglaries or attempted burglaries to occur in such a short time, Velboom said.

"We're working every lead we can and we are getting a lot of cooperation from the community," he said.
