## **Celebration Of Life** Remembers Deputy

Friends And Family Recount Favorite Memories of 'Bo' Harrison

Community members and the Pasco County Sheriff's Office convened at the Lewis Abraham Boys & Girls Club in Lacoochee last week for a memorial service and celebration of life of Capt. Charles "Bo" Albert Harrison Sr.

The service was held June 1, the 14th anniversary of his end of watch in 2003 when he was fatally shot during a surveillance detail.

The room was full of laughter and tears as some of Harrison's relatives

## **Dade City Police Report**

## Man With Machete Faces Aggravated Battery Charge

Leigh Swinford, 39, transient, was arrested by Dade City police on May 27 on charges of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, domestic battery and possession of parahernalia.

Swinford and his girl-

friend of four months, who is also homeless, reportedly became involved in a verbal argument that turned physical. Swinford, who was reportedly holding a machete at the time, allegedly hit the victim in the right side of her head with a closed fist. She then punched him in the face in an attempt to defend herself. The victim told police she was in fear for her life be-

cause Swinford was holding a machete. A glass pipe allegedly containing marijuana residue was found in Swinford's right front pocket during a search following his arrest.

Two 15-year-old males were arrested by Dade City police and charged with loitering and prowling and resisting arrest without violence after they were stopped in the area of Lee Avenue and Dewey Street for allegedly riding a bicycle without any lights at 12:02 a.m. Officers were responding to the area of Withlacoochee Avenue regarding a report of shots having been fired when the youth and three other unknown males were observed riding their bicycles with no lights on them. They reportedly fled into a yard in an attempt to

elude police. They allegedly disregarded several verbal commands by police to stop running. The defendants who were arrested was kept on the ground at gunpoint until backup units arrived.

Amber Marie Jones, 29, of Brooksville, was arrested by Dade City police on May 19 on a charge of petit retail theft and on a Citrus County warrant charging her with violation of probation – grand theft. Jones was detained at

the Pasco County Probation & Parole Office. The theft allegedly occurred at Walmart, 12650 U.S. 301, where Jones was allegedly observed taking a shopping cart full of items without paying for them. She allegedly loaded the items into her vehicle and fled the scene.

Rebecca Lee Spencer, 40, of 14734 Mitchell St., was arrested by Dade City police on May 18 on a charge of possession of marijuana - less than 20 grams. Contact was made with Spencer during a lawful traffic stop. An odor of recently burnt marijuana could be detected when police approached the vehicle. Spencer reportedly told police she had recently smoked marijuana. When asked if she had any marijuana in the vehicle, Spencer reportedly handed police a container that had three marijuana joints inside it along with an ash tray containing burnt joints. An additional marijuana joint was found during a search of the vehicle.

James Vincent Dampier, 53, of Tampa, was arrested by Dade City police on May 5 on a charge of trespass after warning and possession of paraphernalia. Dampier was allegedly sitting in his vehicle parked in the driveway of a residence on Florida Avenue where his former girlfriend lives. He had reportedly been trespassed from the residence on May 4. Dampier told police he was aware of the trespass warning and that he was there to take his ex out for the night. He was arrested and taken to the Pasco County Jail.

Ave., was apprehended by Dade City police on May 25 at the Pasco County Parole & Probation Office on Pasco County warrants charging him with three counts of violation of

probation - burglary and grand theft. He was booked into the Pasco County Jail upon confirmation of the warrants.

### Pasco County Burn Ban Lifted

The Pasco County Board of County Commissioners has lifted a burn ban that it imposed last month because of drought conditions, Doug Tobin said Tuesday.

Effective immediately, residents may resume open burning, campfires, yard waste burning and fireworks, but are encouraged to follow safe burning practices to prevent wildfires, said Tobin, the county's public information officer

Pasco County Parks, Recreation and

Natural Resources is also rescinding its county-wide burn ban; however, parks staff reserves the right to reinstate a no-open flame policy (campfires) on a day-to-day basis depending on the Fire Danger Index on any given day

Pasco County Parks staff will inform campers of the open burning status during the reservation process, Tobin said.

K-9 Scheduled To Meet Public On June 13

The Dade City Police Department is excited to introduce Tyke, a 15-month old German shepherd, who hit the streets with his partner, Officer Kevin Burns, on June 5. Burns is a 12-year veteran of the agency.

Officer Burns and Tyke recently completed a demanding 16-week training course in patrol procedures and tracking sponsored by the Pasco County Sheriff's Office, said Brian Uppercue, DCPD's public information officer.

The K-9 duo will be formally introduced to the public at the City Commission meeting on June 13 at 5:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

The police K-9 team will quickly become an integral part of the police department and the community. They will be a "force multiplier," capable of searching buildings and tracking suspects, missing children and vulnerable adults.

"Because this dog was purchased through the generosity of the community, I want him to be much more visible to everyday citizens than teams in the past. He will not only be used on patrol, but will be seen interacting downtown and in the schools," said Chief Ray Velboom.



many activities will begin on June 8. A "Captain Underpants" themed event will take place at 11 a.m. for younger children, followed by a pizza party for teens at 3:30 p.m.

kit, but many recent transplants to the Sunshine State have never experienced a hurricane.

Here are a few reminders and essentials to consider when preparing for this hurricane season:

- Familiarize yourself with evacuation areas and know in advance where would you go in case of an evacuation.
- Put together a basic disaster supplies kit and consider storage locations for different situations.
- Plan for pets if it's not safe for you, it's probably not safe for your pet
- Know who to contact familiarize yourself with county and city contacts, local news/radio/weather stations and emergency services to stay up to date and to ask questions about weather conditions. Don't call 911 for information during a hurricane. Only use 911 for emergency purposes.
- Obtain flood insurance now as it can be one of the best ways to protect yourself from a storm.

In addition to preparing the

essentials, Guthrie encouraged residents to download the MyPasco mobile application. The app contains information about a new service, Alert Pasco, which will allow the user to get emergency notifications and severe weather alerts.

"We are checking our generators and other equipment we would use if a hurricane hit the area," Dade City City Manager Billy Poe said.

"We work closely with the Pasco County Emergency Operations Center," Poe said. He added the EOC would keep city officials updated on weather conditions in the Dade City area in the event a storm was headed this way.

It has been several years since a major storm has hit Dade City but residents could expect significant localized flooding if a hurricane or tropical storm dumped a few inches of rain over the area. The city's antiquated storm water system is unable to handle even moderate amounts of rainfall. Loss of power and fallen trees could also be expected

Residents may call the Dade City Police Department at (352) 521-1493 to report flooding or downed trees, especially if they have struck vehicles or structures or are blocking roadways.

#### Area Is Overdue For Major Hurricane

It has been nearly 86 years since the Tampa Bay area was last hit by a major hurricane. A category 3 storm with sustained winds of 115 mph created a storm surge of 10 to 12 feet when it hit Tampa Bay on Oct. 25, 1921. The storm also dumped 8.53 inches of rain on Tampa and Tarpon Springs.

It caused \$10 million in damage in Tampa and \$5 million damage in St. Petersburg in 1921 dollars. Adjusted for inflation, modern damage estimates of the 1921 hurricane were \$150 million combined in Tampa and St. Petersburg.

The hurricane's path ranged from Cuba to Key West, Sanibel and Captiva islands, Fort Myers, Estero Island, Punta Gorda and the Tampa Bay area.

Most of the damage to the Tampa and St. Petersburg areas were caused

by storm surges and abnormally high tides.

The Tampa Bay area was also hit by major hurricanes in 1910 and 1848.

An Oct. 17, 1910 hurricane blew water out of Tampa Bay to the lowest level ever recorded up to that time.

The hurricane of Sept. 23-25, 1848, produced the highest storm tide ever experienced in the area. The water rose and fell about 15 feet in six to eight hours.

This storm, known as the Great Gale of 1848, hit Fort Brooke, a military outpost in the Tampa area.

That storm also completely changed the coastal geography of the Tampa Bay area by cutting new inlets, filling in others, and altering the shapes of bays and keys. This rendered navigational charts of that time useless.

Andrea Ciesluk of Pasco County Animal Services said residents should remember to consider their pets when making an emergency plan.

Be sure your planned evacuation route will take you to a place that is pet friendly. Some hotels will allow people to bring their pets with them if they seek shelter there. However, such rooms are quickly booked when a storm is looming

Animals should be up to date on shots not safe for your pet," she said.


and have the proper identification and paperwork acknowledging their health. Microchips should be updated with current records in case of separation and loss of collars or leashes.

A pet emergency kit should contain: vaccination records, food bowls, leashes, a crate in case where you're going doesn't allow free roaming animals, a week's worth of food, littler and litter boxes for cats and poop bags for dogs.

"If you can't get to your pet in time make sure you have a backup plan – a trusted friend or neighbor, someone who lives near you who could come in and care for your pet until you get back to them," Ciesluk said.

If there is a shelter where it is safe to board your pet, Ciesluk said it is okay to board your pet. Never leave your pet behind in your home.

"If you're home's not safe for you, it's not safe for your pet." she said.





#### What's The Fate Of Your Prostate?

This is a special month as Father's Day approaches. I think it's a safe assumption that men in general do not enjoy going to the doctor's office, but we all enjoy the idea of preventing health problems down the road. So, is a prostate cancer screening something you should do? The short answer is maybe.

According to the USPSTF (U.S. Preventive Services Task Force), prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed non- skin cancer in men in the United States, with most cases having a good prognosis even without treatment. Even though it's a common cancer, the lifetime risk for dying of

prostate cancer is 2.8% with very few men dying of prostate cancer before age 60 years. Screening generally involves either DRE (digital rectal examination) or blood test with PSA (prostate specific antigen). If this testing is abnormal, a Urologist will determine need for biopsy and assess the presence of cancer.

As of 2017, guidelines from the Urological American Association recommend against screening for prostate cancer in men under 40 years of age, men greater than 70 years of age and men 40-55 years of age with average risk. This guideline changes if you are considered higher risk such as positive family history of prostate cancer or African American race in which you should consider screening.

Pay attention because if you are between ages of 55-69 years of age, there is not a clear yes or no recommendation for prostate cancer screening. Screening at this age group is largely individualized. It's important to assess the benefits versus the risks of screening, such as psychological stress with a borderline result and complications from a biopsy. Discussing this with your primary care provider will help you decide if a prostate cancer screening is right for you.

and closest friends recalled their favorite memories with him.

Most the program was handed over to William "Willie" Broner Jr., Harrison's lifetime best friend.

"Today gives me great pleasure to honor a great man, a great father, a great uncle, a great law enforcement officer... a great Christian, a great athlete and my great, great friend, Capt. Charles "Bo" Harrison," Broner said.

After opening with a joke, Broner asked the more than 150 people in the room for a standing ovation for all law enforcement present from the Pasco County Sheriff's Office. Harrison, who died at the age of 57, was the sheriff's department's first black deputy, rising to the rank of lieutenant before his death

only 15 days away from retirement. He was posthumously promoted to the rank of captain.

Harrison's shooter, Alfredie Steele Jr., of Lacoochee, who was 19 at the time, turned himself in two days later. He was subsequently convicted in Harrison's death and is serving a life sentence.

Broner talked about how inspiring Harrison was to the children of their community, showing them how they, too, could achieve great things in life, and the importance of giving back to those around them.

"Bo was a man with a big heart for helping others... Bo realized early in life... love isn't love until you give it away," Broner said.

After telling tales of childhood shenanigans and playing on the high school football team together, Broner had to pause when bringing up the duo's time together in Vietnam.

"When I was in Vietnam, Bo was in Vietnam at the same time. Bo, he drove 20 miles through enemy territory all alone, just to see his friend. I knew I had a special friend at that time," Broner said, bringing tears to dozens as they pulled out tissues and handkerchiefs

from their pockets.

"Bo had the recipe for life... I will always treasure his friendship," Broner concluded.

Harrison's love for music was then honored during the memorial service. The men's choir of St. John Missionary Baptist Church of Dade City, which Bo participated in as much as possible, sang three songs dedicated to the captain. Guests sang and clapped along, smiling as they thought of their own memories of Harrison.


Other speakers at the memorial included Pasco Sheriff Chris Nocco, retired deputy Bert Ferguson, and Luevenia Harrison, Bo Harrison's sister, who recited a poem she had written.

Luevenia's poem described Harrison as her second dad growing up, always making sure she followed the straight and narrow path and always looking out for her.

"You are in my soul; gone but not forgotten," she said.
