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# Pasco County Citizens Sound Off

Town Hall In Dade City Features Some Tough Questions

In an effort to step forward and give their constituents answers to the tough questions, four local legislators representing Pasco County turned out Tuesday night for a Town Hall Meeting at Pasco Middle School.

With nearly 100 people in the audience in the school's auditorium, Congressman Gus Bilirakis (R-12th Dist.) and state Rep. Danny Burgess (R-38th Dist.) joined state Sens. Wilton Simpson (R-10th Dist.) and Tom Lee (R-20th Dist.) to field questions with topics ranging from Obamacare to the environment and medical marijuana to opioid addiction.

Burgess, who has taken part in the East Pasco Town Hall meeting for the last three years, was energized watching democracy at work.

That spirit was evident as 16-year-

### Dade City Car Show Will Be Shifting Gears

People bringing their classic rides to Dade City on Sept. 2 will have a couple of options on how they can display them, Ronnie Setser said Monday.

A cruise in format has been held for the past several years for the show that is held the first Saturday of each month around the historic courthouse square.

People came when they wanted and left when they wanted and didn't have to pay anything to show their vehicles, said Setser.

Next month's show, the inaugural one of the season, will be different. The event has been renamed the Dade City Car Show and it will be held from 3-7 p.m.

People who wish to have their vehicles judged in various trophy categories will need to register them and pay \$10 per vehicle, Setser said. The first 50 people registering will be granted the best parking spaces and will receive dash plaques.

A ceremony will be held at 6 p.m. during which trophies will be presented with categories ranging

## Woman Faces Down Alleged 'Armed' Teen Robbers

A 13-year-old male was arrested by Dade City police on July 27 on a charge of robbery with a firearm. A male and female victim were approached from behind by two male juveniles on July 26 at 11:56 p.m. while they were walking south along 17th Street. Both juveniles allegedly said, "Give me everything you got." One of them then allegedly produced an unknown semiautomatic handgun, racked the slide back and pointed the gun at the female victim. The male victim had run away in an attempt to distract the two juveniles. The female victim told the suspect who was pointing the gun at her she had just called 911. Both suspects then ran north away from the area. A suspect was identified from word on the street

following the robbery attempt and the two victims positively identified him as the person who had been involved in the armed robbery. An Airsoft semiautomatic BB pistol was recovered. The suspect spontaneously said, "Yeah, I robbed those people." Post Miranda, the teenager said, with his mother present during the interview, that he had committed the offense.

Dewan Maurice Flores, 24, of Orlando,



was arrested by Dade City police on July 11 on a charge of possession of cocaine. Flores was a backseat passenger in a vehicle that had been stopped on the U.S. 98 Bypass for reckless driving. Flores allegedly had a battery charging port in his right front pocket. The port contained a white substance that field-tested positive as cocaine. He was booked into the Pasco County Jail.

Christopher Vincent Johnson, 23,



# **Paving A Future**

### Multiple Road Projects In The Works

If you think east Pasco County is being rebuilt you're not far off.

A Monday night Transportation Summit revealed just how much the landscape is changing when officials noted nearly half a billion dollars is being spent on road construction projects in east Pasco alone.

Data from the summit updated the much-publicized big projects underway, such as reconstructing state roads 54 and 52, but attention is also being paid to 'smaller' endeavors that have needed attention for some time.

Pasco County Administrator Dan Biles said the numbers are a bit of a moving target, but current project costs are estimated to be \$426,393,465 worth of work to be done east of U.S. Highway 41.

At the top of the list are State Road 54, from Curley Road east to Morris Bridge/Eiland Boulevard (\$92,608,260), and the State Road 52/Clinton Avenue Extension (\$89,879,480). The new 52 is due to be completed in two years.

FDOT District 7 Secretary David Gwynn delivered details on the projects by way of a slide presentation most of the upcoming work is taking place south of Dade City,

but there were a few rural projects of note.

Two intersections on Curley Road,
one at St. Joe Road (\$2,423,000) and
the other from Drake Estates Way to Old

the other from Drake Estates Way to Old St. Joe Road (\$90,250) are slated for improvement and resurfacing.

As well, Scharber Road heading to St. Joe Road (\$962,640), and Jessamine Road from St. Joe Road to James Road, (\$1,449,600), are scheduled for resurfacing.

An emergency fire signal (\$369,448) is planned for the U.S. 301/State Road 575 intersection in Trilacoochee.

Southeast of Dade City, resurfacing is set for Old Lakeland Highway, from Lynbrook Drive to Ottis Allen Road (\$683,750).

The difficult intersection of Handcart Road and Eiland Boulevard is slated for improvement and signalization (\$366,510).

Wire Road will be resurfaced from County Road 54 in Zephyrhills all the way

to U.S. 301 (\$1,500,000). No timetable has been set for that project.

Also included in the overall picture is the continued creation of the Withlacoochee Trail connector (\$5,455,503), which also isn't due for completion until 2021.

All these projects cost a lot of money and as county commissioner Mike Moore pointed out, it takes time for each of them to come to fruition, as there are design and planning stages that need to be funded at different times.

A chunk of that money comes from the federal government.

Rep. Gus Bilirakis (12th District) also attended the summit at Pasco Hernando State College at Wiregrass Ranch and expressed confidence that an infrastructure package that was promised by President Trump during the 2016 campaign will gain approval from Congress.

"It's a priority for the president, it's a priority for Congress ... we got to get it done, for obvious reasons," Bilirakis said.



from best hot rod to best interior and from best engine to best custom paint job.

The \$10 fee is not mandatory to show a vehicle, Setser said. People who simply wish to cruise in and show their vehicles won't have to pay the fee. It will only be charged to those who wish to participate in the awards presentation.

One of the reasons for this change is to help keep people in the historic downtown business district longer while they are showing their vehicles, Setser said, as folks tend to stay longer when there an awards presentation is held.

The people who register their vehicles will also receive goodie bags from area merchants. The bags will contain incentives for attendees to spend time in area restaurants and shops. They will also receive a complimentary copy of a magazine about area car shows.

"The whole idea is to get the downtown businesses to stay open later," Setser said.

Out-of-town vendors have been allowed to sell their wares at previous car

shows but now only Dade City businesses will participate to keep the money in town.

There will be more to the car show than just cars, trucks and other vehicles.

Music will include rock and roll music, a little bit of country, and oldies from the 1940s, '50s and '60s.

Hula-hoop contests and other events will be held to keep children busy while their parents or older siblings look at the vehicles.

"This is going to be a well-run, self-contained program," Setser said.

The Dade City Merchants Association is organizing the Dade City Car Show and will be responsible for promoting it through advertisements, said Margaret Angell, the association's president.

Setser has operated various car shows in the area over the past several years.

He has hosted the Kumquat Festival Car Show for 17 years and prior to that was involved in car shows in Zephyrhills for more than 20 years.

# **Revamped ER Reopens**

### FHZ Service Handles An Average Of 95 Patients A Day

After 18 months and \$5 million, Florida Hospital Zephyrhills has finally finished the construction and renovations of its new and improved emergency services department.

A VIP open house and ribbon cutting ceremony was held Aug. 16, where outgoing hospital President and CEO Randy Surber thanked everyone for attending including hospital board members, City Manager Steve Spina and state Rep. Danny Burgess.

"The outcome has just been absolutely tremendous. It's something I think the community is going to be extremely proud of," Surber said.

Appetizers were served while a video presentation took visitors on a virtual guide through the new facilities. As the ER

is active, an on-foot tour was not possible.

After the virtual tour, guests gathered in front of the ER lobby entrance for an official ribbon cutting with the Greater Zephyrhills and Dade City Chambers of Commerce.

Dr. Seta Ruiz, director of the emergency department and clinical decision unit, said the ER has been nice and busy following the completed renovations. The positive results can be seen in the attitude from staff and patients.

"I do think the patients are getting a different feel from the ER – a soothing environment ... we were in a cramped area for a very long time and now we can spread out," Ruiz said.

Last year the hospital had more than 35,000 emergency room visits, and the renovation will help to keep operations efficient, according to Ruiz.

The ER remained open throughout the year and a half construction period, causing a lot of headaches on all sides, according to Emergency Department Medical Director Dr. Alexander Garcia.

"I think the privacy for the patients is

key. Now we have more privacy for the patients," he said.

Garcia mentioned the improved fast track and results waiting rooms as areas he sees having the most positive affect for patients.

"We want to thank the community for

being patient. The ER staff, the physicians, everyone here is really excited the construction is over," said FHZ Director of Marketing Susan Frimmel.

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## Retirement Plans For City Employees Changing

### Personnel Will Now Be Covered By State System As Opposed To National

A split city commission agreed Tuesday to have Dade City's employees participate in the Florida Retirement System.

Dade City withdrew from the FRS in 1996 but five city employees and two commissioners remained with it; others opted for the Nationwide Retirement

City Manager Billy Poe recommended taking another look at the FRS because of dissatisfaction with the Nationwide plan that currently covers most city employees.

"We have employees who are on a different plan who probably wouldn't benefit from going on the Florida Retirement Plan," commissioner James

"It's a great plan – a sound plan – that would be good to get into," Shive said regarding the FRS.

Mayor Pro Tem Eunice Penix, a retired schoolteacher, said she is on the FRS and thinks it is a good plan.

But Mayor Camille Hernandez to five years. delivered some pushback.

"This is a very serious thing," Hernandez said. "I know that our existing plan is not a very good one, but I continue to be concerned about the sustainability over time of being able to give employees three percent raises and keep up with the healthcare costs.

"I know that the plan we have now is not the best one but I want to be fair to the new hires who will be coming on." Hernandez explained the benefits that are currently available through the FRS could be changed in the future by state legislators.

Should the city choose the FRS, Hernandez said, she wants to make sure they are willing to make a commitment to it for the long haul.

Hernandez emphasized she would like for the city to look at other options in addition to the FRS before making a decision. If the plan were changed, she would like to see it phased in over three

Commissioner Nicole Deese Newlon said some people she has talked to have expressed concerns about the FRS being underfunded. She added she now believes the state legislature has taken steps to see that it is in better financial condition so her concerns are a bit alleviated.

"I still remain in support of moving to the FRS," Newlon said.

Commissioner Scott Black voiced strong opposition to the proposed change.

He prefers the city having a privately designed benefit plan upon which the city would have more control. He emphasized the state, not the city, would control how the FRS is handled.

"When the legislature changes this it's going to affect our new hires. It's not a case of if, it's a case of when," Black said. "You are going to have some gross inequities among our own employees. If we have control of our program we can provide better for our employees on an equal basis."

"No matter what you do, you're not going to know what's going to happen down the road," Shive said. "I don't think it's really going to be that much of an inequity.'

Penix moved and Shive seconded to approve FRS as the city's retirement plan.

'This is forever and forever and when employees are not satisfied with it there is no way to get out," Black said.

The measure passed by a 3-2 vote. Commissioners Newlon and Shive and Penix voted in favor of participating in the FRS. Mayor Hernandez and commissioner Black voted against it.

City employees who are hired after the FRS was adopted will be covered by the plan. Employees who are on the Nationwide Plan can remain on it or use the time they have accrued in it to be covered by the FRS, Poe said.

## Bilirakis Fights Opioid Epidemic

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention more than 90 Americans die every day because of an opioid overdose. It's been termed as a crisis, an epidemic, and Florida is grappling with the damage and desperate for ways to stem the tide.

Congressman Gus Bilirakis (R-FL 12th Dist.), underscored that alarm when his visited Land O' Lakes to discuss the situation in a roundtable with about 40 healthcare providers, advocates and recovering addicts.

"As I am sure you are aware, more people are dying each year from opioid overdose than from car accidents," he said in his opening remarks. "The statistics are staggering and truly tragic."

Bilirakis had the director of the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy Michael Boticelli come to Pasco County as part of the congressman's effort to get funding for Florida to combat the epidemic.

Bilirakis, known for his devotion to military veterans issues, spoke about his achievements in Washington.

"My PROMISE Act [passed] last year, which requires the use of best prescribing practices. It was passed in honor of a veteran from Wisconsin, Jason Simcakowski, who overdosed on opioids while at a VA hearing. Too many opioids are being prescribed to our heroes as the first line of treatment for PTS (Post Traumatic Stress) and TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury)."

On Tuesday night in Wesley Chapel, Bilirakis said better training for VA doctors who prescribe opioids is

The congressman told Wednesday's group that he was also behind the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act that was signed into law, reauthorizing grant programs and promoting the availability of naloxone for first responders.

Bilirakis said he was encouraged when President Trump declared the opioid epidemic as a national emergency but Trump has yet to sign the necessary paperwork to release funds to fight it. The congressman hopes it will "come by the end of the month".

It has been widely reported that in the late 1990s, pharmaceutical giants convinced the medical community that prescription opioid pain relievers were not addictive, prompting healthcare providers to confidently prescribe them to control pain. In 2015, the CDC reported more than 33,000 Americans died from opioid overdose, which included prescription opioids, heroin, and illicitly manufactured fentanyl, a synthetic opioid reportedly 10 times the strength of morphine.

Bilirakis advocates alternative therapies for veterans.

"One size does not fit all when it comes to the mental health needs of our veterans and my [PROMISE] bill not only addresses prescribing practices, but also paves the way for the VA to provide alternative and complementary treatments to Veterans," he said.

However, one alternative he does not care for is medical marijuana.

"I've talked to physicians about it and maybe short term it can help people but it's very detrimental in the



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# Bright Lights, Big City Blackwood Products Dance At Joffrey In NYC

This summer has marked the rise of many talented east Pasco youth; some act, others sing, but the latest rising stars are dancing darlings.

Seventeen-year-old dance students Victoria Neukom of Dade City, and Hannah Knight of Zephyrhills, each received scholarships to the prestigious Joffrey Ballet School in New York City.

Neukom has been dancing since the age of three and by age five was taking classes at Blackwood Studios in Dade City.

"Even before I was put into dance classes, my grandma would turn on music and I would dance around the room," recalled Neukom. "I can't remember a time I wasn't excited to go to dance."

Neukom received a 90 percent tuition scholarship for the Joffrey experience, where she is currently studying in a two-week program. The school has become her home away from home.

"The teachers here are incredible people and so inspiring," Neukom said of the school. "New York feels so right ... I feel like I belong here."

When Neukom returns to Florida she will begin classes at the Marshall Ellis Dance School in Orlando for some intensive training.

Similarly, Hannah Knight began dancing at Blackwood Studios at an early age. She received a 60 percent tuition scholarship for Joffrey's summer intensive program.


"Being at Joffrey makes you feel like you are in an actual dance company in New York City," said Knight. "It's super cool to experience what it would feel like as a working professional dancer."

After her time at Joffrey is completed, Knight is looking forward to returning to the Meridian Avenue studio full time.

"Blackwood is like one big family," Knight said. "There's truly no place like it."

Both Neukom and Knight find great joy in their performance art, but dancing, at its core, is an extremely competitive and taxing sport.

"The hardest part about dancing is that it's really hard

old Pasco High School student Adam Filinovich asked the panel of legislators how they can ensure that democracy is strong and thriving in the United States.

"You do that by hosting town halls," Burgess said. "You do that by always being visible and present in your community and to the people you represent and the people who elected you to serve them.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for me to talk about state issues, federal issues and everything that matters to us. I think what we did today is break all kinds of barriers and stereotypes. We saw civil discourse."

Filinovich, who was well-versed on the issues, used the town hall as a way to learn what local elected officials are thinking and let them hear from their constituents.

"It's important for them to hear the opposing views to what they have," Filinovich said, in challenging the lawmakers to explain their positions.

Education funding on the state level was a hot topic demonstrated by a question posed by Lisa Mazza: why are charter schools receiving funds and public schools are not being fully funded?

Burgess, a "proud product" of the Pasco County school system, explained that his support for the legislation came because it benefitted every child.

"The bill we passed had the highest level of funding in the state of Florida's history with \$15.3 billion," Burgess said. "This bill made the school districts share their millage with charter schools. I am a firm believer in school choice.

"At the end of the day, I look at whether it is in the best interest of all the kids – not whether they are public school kids, charter school kids or homeschool kids. Is this going to help children? We have over 100 failing schools in this state. That is a state of emergency."

Bilirakis was the focus of the majority of the fire from the audience regarding the failure of a Republican-backed healthcare reform bill as well as the deficiencies in care for veterans from medical facilities operated by the Veterans Administration. While the House passed their version of healthcare reform, the Senate failed to follow and the issue died.

Bilirakis, the vice chairman of the veterans committee, said more firings are coming for incompetent mid and

upper level VA employees in an effort to improve performance and care.

He also champions a variety of treatments and choice for veterans.

"One-size treatment for our veterans doesn't fit all," Bilirakis said passionately. "There are several alternative therapies that work. Veterans come to me every day about this and tell me they are lost. They just give a bunch of pills and offer them some counseling and send them home.

"That's not how you treat heroes. This needs to change now.
