Loss Of Participants, Logistics **Cited As Major Hurdles**

To the dismay of the Pasco County Fair directors and residents, this year's 70th annual fair will not be accompanied by a parade on opening day.

After running into some initial hurdles, the board originally vowed to do whatever it took to keep the parade floats afloat. However, at their Jan. 12 meeting, new circumstances arose that backed them into a corner they could not get out of.

Once they started moving forward, the momentum hasn't stopped as teams and sponsors have jumped on board.

Thomas Promise will use the money from the daylong walk to fund its weekend backpack program that helps

Fair general manager Clark Converse said the board "agonized" over the decision and there was no easy answer.

Overall, there were two major factors at work.

as well as Dade City's Christmas parade, have drastically declined throughout the years. The county fair parade has gone from about 80 to last year's 34 parade entries and the Christmas parade's usual 100 or so entries has shrunk to about 60 a year.

That fact alone has been a concern of the parade committee, Converse said. The amount of work that goes into the parade compared to the loss of participation has become "frustrating" for organizers.

The second major factor can be blamed on the two days lost to closure in the fall because of hurricane warnings. Because of that, schools will not close for President's Day this year, when the parade is normally scheduled. This change has severely affected not just the planning but also the execution of the parade.

With school in session, school buses won't be available to transport bands from around the county for the march through downtown. Converse added that with school in session, participation and spectator attendance would naturally shrink.

Line-ups for the fair parade normally start at Cox Elementary and end at Pasco Elementary School, but with school in session the parade times would need to correlate with the schools' dismissal.

In general, the school conflict added other safety and traffic and congestion concerns that ended up being too much.

Converse said the planning committee had the permits for road closures finalized prior to the schools President's Day decision, which makes the planned parade route moot. New permits with the city and county would take at least 60 to 90 days to acquire, Converse said, which was already impossible when he found out the need for them.

"We hadn't thought of the conflict with dismissal times with the schools," Converse said glumly. "There's too many negatives and not enough positives. We understand the community is extremely disappointed in us. We are extremely disappointed it can't happen." He added that the fair board considered every option to make it possible but none were deemed feasible.

Since the decision was announced via Facebook, board members and even School Superintendent Kurt Browning have received criticism.

Converse said Browning is not responsible in any way for the rules involving hurricane days and the days that are set aside for mandatory testing toward the end of the school calendar.

And just because the fair is cancelled this year, Converse said there is hope for next year, and that he and the board will do what they can to bring a vibrant, well-attended parade back.

On a positive note, Converse said this year's 70th Pasco County Fair will be full of new and exciting attractions, as well as the classics. A full calendar of events has already been placed on www.pascocountyfair.com.

This year's fair will take place from Feb. 20 through Feb. 26.

"Because a lot of the winter people are down and there's a circuit of shows that the vendors go to, so there will be more vendors and more spectators," Pearson said.

Pearson expects about 1,100 vendor spaces will be filled, and that the festival will welcome somewhere around 20,000 people between it's four days from Feb. 16-19.

"It's a family style outing with cars and all kinds of different auto related items," Pearson said.

No matter how it is referred to -a swap meet, automotive flea market, auto jumble - it is a big draw for auto enthusiasts.

Vendor spaces are 10 feet wide by 30 feet long and will be filled to the brim with all kinds of classic and souped-up wheels.

Pearson and her husband Craig have hosted car swap meets for more than 25 years, and have been preparing for this weekend since their last event wrapped up in October. About half of the people who participate in the fall event return for the winter fest, making for plenty of new eye candy and car parts.

Pearson said car lovers drive from as far as Canada, California and Connecticut to participate in what she calls "four days of car bliss."

Hundreds of cars will be up for sale and auction between the classic car auction and car corral. In the car corral, individual owners are responsible for selling their whips. The car auction will take place Feb. 18 and will be led by Sun Coast Auto Auctions. Pearson said if they auction receives enough entries, an additional auction will precede the main sell-off on Feb. 17.

The auction will see cars cross the block in any of the following categories: Muscle Car, Street Rod, Classic Car, Antique, Luxury, Exotic, Race Car, Sports Car, Specialty Truck and Motorcycle.

The swap meet and car corral take place all four days for people looking for a specific car part, or others who may not even know what they want until they see it.

Don't forget to check out the valvecover races, where participants will be entered into a people's choice competition for best-decorated valve cover before putting it to the test on the track.

Even if cars aren't you're thing, Pearson said there are always vendors selling vintage t-shirts and other memorabilia. There will also be daily door prizes and trivia questions, food vendors, and the first 200 spectators that attend each day will receive a free collector cap.

When he started his project at age 17 he said nobody even knew his name.

"I told them my mission. Instead of raising \$4,500, I raised \$9,000," he said. "The whole community lit up and people were calling me and asking how they could help me. It was shocking to me that people were coming up to me and saying they were proud of me."

The MOPH plans to use the additional funds to make some other improvements at the site in the park.

Meeting some people who influenced him was another benefit of his journey towards becoming an Eagle Scout, Caldwell said. Two of them – U.S. Rep. Gus Bilirakis, R-FL (12), and state Rep. Danny Burgess, R-FL (38) – impressed him as honorable men who care a lot about U.S. veterans and he credits them for helping him choose to honor MOPH.

A vandal destroyed one of the benches in 2016 and plans are in the works to replace it, Caldwell said.

On Jan. 15, Earl McMillan, commander Chapter #705 of the MOPH, presented him his Eagle Scout badge and pin.

Caldwell has been involved in scouting for about 12 years, first becoming a Cub Scout at age 6 while he was living in Massachusetts. He earned Cub Scouting's highest rank, the Arrow of Light, after moving to Florida when he was 9 years old. Caldwell joined the Boy Scouts soon afterward and quickly determined his goal was to be an Eagle Scout. He joined Troop 72 when he and his parents, James Edward "Ed" and Regina Caldwell, moved to Zephyrhills two years ago. He has earned 29

merit badges, including last month's Eagle badge.

"I worked toward it with all that I could. I don't like leaving a job half done," Caldwell said.

"At the end of the day, the Eagle pin goes on your uniform. It's an accolade," he said. "But it represents service to your community. I'm proud to call members of the Military Order of the Purple Heart my friends."

Caldwell has earned some college credits through being an Advanced Placement Honor student at Zephyrhills High School. He has been a member of the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps program for four years and plans on enlisting in the U.S. Navy after he graduates from ZHS on May 25. His career goal is to be involved in nuclear engineering as it is the most academically challenging area in the Navy.

Little Everglades Going Big Tours, Hot Air Balloons To Showcase Ranch

Sprawling across 2,050 acres of fields and farmland, Little Everglades Ranch is an oasis of green grass fields and a perfect place for entertaining events.

Iconic for once hosting steeplechase horse races, the ranch is now embarking on a new venture: Ranch Days.

Event organizer Kevin Campbell said he and his wife Andy have wanted to put on a big event like this for years, and on Feb. 11 and 12 their hard work will be realized.

This is the first 'home-grown' production put on by the ranch since the steeplechase was shut down when the recession hit in 2008. Since then, the property has been host to numerous events including high school cross country championships and extreme sport runs, such as the Savage Race.

With Ranch Days, Campbell hopes to bring something new to the plate.

Even though the ranch comprises thousands of acres, most events use less

than a quarter of that. Because of that, Campbell has organized five different ways for visitors to explore the property and it's mysterious appeal.

"People have always asked us when they come out ... if we give tours," Campbell said. "So part of this event, of why we're doing this event, is to give people a chance to see the ranch."

With that in mind, a Zephyrhills Boy Scout troop will be leading hiking tours across the property, a tram will scoot across the multiple fields, and a 12-seat swamp buggy will delve into the wetlands to go even deeper into the ranch.

Campbell said one of the more exciting tour vehicles will be provided by a larc, a Vietnam era boat and land cruiser, which was originally used to transport equipment off of ships that couldn't dock in Vietnam. It's duck-tour like presence will provide an exciting adventure for participants on the ground and in a lake across the property.

The last, and most uplifting, tour vehicle will be two hot air balloons which, weather permitting, will offer tethered rides so visitors can get an aerial view of the ranch.

On the night of Feb. 11, Campbell hopes to welcome an additional three hot air balloons to participate in a 'hot air balloon glow.'

"They're going to fire up their balloons which makes the balloon illuminate, it's like a light bulb up inside of there. And it will just be real pretty up in the evening sky," Campbell said.

All of the tours will be offered for a fee and the two-day event will also feature a slew of free musical entertainment and live shows. Where the finish line used to be for the steeplechase on the 1.25-mile long grass track, "exciting exhibitions"

will be performing both days.

Tino Wallenda will perform highwire walking, Lady Kitty will bring some feathered friends for a birds of prey presentation, and Jim Mendenhall, famous for his involvement with the San Antonio Rattlesnake Festival, will present indigenous snakes. More recently added to the schedule is a chainsaw artist, who will be doing live woodcarvings.

"There will always be something going on with those four shows," Campbell said. "We're hoping people take advantage of the great entertainment we're providing. We feel it's a real value for families ... if they come with full tummies, they can literally come out here and spend hours for 10 bucks looking at all the great entertainment we have and enjoy all the stuff we're putting out there."

As far as live music goes, Campbell said that is top notch as well. About a dozen regional artists will perform on two opposing stages throughout the day, playing some of the best country,

bluegrass and Americana in the area.

A kids area and a free junior Savage Race course will be available for the younger crowd.

Food, beverage and craft vendors will also be set up on the property for visitors to enjoy.

The ranch was recently put in a conservancy with the Southwest Florida Water Management District, meaning it can never be developed.

"It will always remain a working ranch and a nature preserve and an events facility," Campbell said. "The ranch is also such a beautiful place to do this at, I'm really hoping people take advantage of that."

The entrance for Ranch Days at Little Everglades Ranch is located at U.S. 301 and Gould Road, just north of Dade City. Entry into the event is free with \$10 parking. Hours are 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Feb. 11 and 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Feb. 12. Visit RanchDays.com for a full schedule, list of activities and other information.


