

This Year's Annual Christmas Kickoff Is Dec. 3



Zephyrhills Arrests

Transient Arrested On Multiple Felony Charges

New Ultrasound Unit Making Waves

FHZ Using The **Most Advanced Breast Cancer Tool**

In light of recently upgrading their robotic system, Florida Hospital Zephyrhills has added yet another piece of valuable technology to their menu. For about six weeks now, the Simpson Breast Health Center has been using a new Aixplorer Supersonic Imagine, the latest tool in breast ultrasound technology.

"Having the newest technology is critical to accurately ascertain which masses are truly suspicious needing biopsy," Dr. Ronald C. Prati, said in an email.

The new technology reportedly provides a resolution that has thrilled FHZ physicians, radiologists and equipment technicians for its clarity.

According to the hospital, the "shear wave elastography" technology allows health professionals to get clearer images and provide a quicker diagnosis of masses in dense breasts.

Dense breasts often pose a problem for normal ultrasounds or other x-ray technology because there is normally too much other tissue or material interfering with the image. Potential patients with dense breasts that are interested

in accessing the new technology first need to keep their regular mammogram appointment to determine whether the Imagine session is needed.

"It judges the stiffness of the legion," said Alexa Stinnette, Breast Imaging Manager. "By that, the radiologist can determine whether or not it needs a biopsy ... it's just an amazing resolution. So, instead of struggling to see certain layers, you can quickly identify different types of breast tissue."

What used to take possibly days to correctly identify a benign mass can now be done in seconds.

Stinnette said it is now easier to determine whether or not a woman has to undergo the pain of a biopsy because the image clarity allows more certainty when making that decision.

The Supersonic Imagine's advanced waves also allow radiologists to detect smaller cancers faster than traditional methods.

"Our physicians have been extremely pleased with what we have been able to see, as well as the technologists ourselves," Stinnette said. "It's very exciting to have a technology that you know is going to be a benefit [for the patient] and you know you're not increasing radiation dose. And it's comfortable for the patient."

The compact machine sits in the corner of one of the exam rooms in the Simpson Breast Health Center. It is easily wheeled

and maneuvered around the room.

The more the radiologists use the machine, the better they will be in determining the volume of a mass before surgery even happens, thanks to it's 3D

"We're hoping to do volumetrics...

be able to give the pathologist a better idea of how large the lesion is, so when the patient goes into surgery they have a better idea of the whole volume of the lesion they're going after," Stinnette explained.

"And it takes seconds."







Volunteers Shoe Schools One Step At A Time

Local Nonprofit Has Been Steadily Growing In The Area

When Janet Chubinsky started volunteering for the Children's Outreach Program Effort, she and many other volunteers quickly realized they needed to narrow their target.

After originally working with local churches to provide children with clothes and sundry items, they noticed that shoes were what children needed the most.

That was about five years ago.

Today, Chubinsky is the program director for Shoes 4 Schools, a nonprofit 501c3 that works year round to provide new and gently used shoes for children.

The organization works with the ABC programs at 15 schools in Pasco County, including West Zephyrhills Elementary School, Zephyrhills High School, Rodney B. Cox Elementary and Lacoochee Elementary School. The schools relay information on sizes and specific shoe needs of the children.

After starting small and exclusively at Raymond B. Stewart Middle School, Chubinsky said other schools caught on fast and requested shoes for their own students.

The first year, Shoes 4 Schools provided about 40 pairs of shoes at the middle school. This year, Chubinsky said she and nine other volunteers have distributed almost 2,000 pairs of shoes.

She said Christmas orders are going to be tough to fill this year, because the need for shoes is so great in the Tampa Bay region. Schools in Hillsborough County have even reached out to Shoes 4 Schools, but Chubinsky is unsure if they have the

manpower to cover such a range.

"For Christmas right now it's unbelievable," Chubinsky said. "As soon as we get these shoes they're gone. So we can't get to he point where we've got an accumulation that we can go in at anytime and pull them off the shelves. The need is that bad."

She hopes that should the organization get some help from local governments and public figures they might be able to expand their reach in the future.

Another issue Shoes 4 Schools has had is competing with other organizations that hold massive shoe collecting events only once a year.

Chubinsky said she wishes organizations that only host only one annual event would join with Shoes 4

Schools to combine their efforts, since Shoes 4 Schools works year round to service schools.

The volunteers at Shoes 4 Schools work almost every day, picking up donations, delivering shoes and working to get others involved. Along with other groups, Shoes 4 Schools recently volunteered at Farm Share, which was hosted by Rep. Danny Burgess.

Shoes 4 Schools mainly provides athletic shoes, but will occasionally buy dress shoes. When they get what they call "quality new" or brand name shoes, they mainly deliver these to high school students so they can wear them to interviews or other important events.

When the organization receives donated "quality used" shoes, Chubinsky

said there are four volunteers who mainly clean and ensure the shoes are in tip-top shape for their new owners.

Right now the organization is raising last-minute funds to fill an order of shoes from Chester W. Taylor Elementary School.

The raffle includes golfing packages, dinner packages and gift certificates from different Pasco County businesses, with the winner selected on Dec. 2. Contact Chubinsky at jchubinsky@gmail.com or (931) 210-0184 for information and how to buy tickets.

The best way to donate shoes is to drop them off at one of three Shoes 4 Schools' locations inside Zephyrhills businesses. Decorated shoe boxes can be found on the west side at East Pasco YMCA, 37301 Chapel Hill Loop; north at Lowe's at 7921 Gall Blvd.; and at Hole in One Donuts, toward the center of town at 5914 Gall Blvd.
